FACE TOFACE WITH THE MARK

Prof. Fouache Vice Chancellor

Paris-Sorbonne University Abu Dhabi has celebrated its ten years anniversary and has renewed its contract. We take this opportunity to meet with Professor Eric Fouache, Vice Chancellor at Sorbonne Abu Dhabi to know more about the future projects.

Who is Eric Fouache?

I was born in Le Havre, one of the largest ports in northern France where the Seine River meets the English Channel. My father was a sailor and spent a lot of time away in the sea traveling the world, while my younger brother and Hooked through the maps in the atlas wondering where my dad would be, eagerly waiting to receive postcards on his whereabouts and hear his exciting news. I think it was as early as then when I had developed my interest in foreign countries and culture, and a passion for travels.

Moving on, I lived over twenty-five years in Rouen, and from an interest to major in journalism, I found myself studying geography – the world of today, which was quite an uncommon subject at the time. I did well and my professor advised that I continue my masters with him in geomorphology, the study of the physical features of the surface of the earth and their relation to its geological structures, of which I had no prior knowledge in, but it required traveling and so I took that opportunity and my future started shaping accordingly.

Thus, I was the first geographer to work on a PHD fully dedicated to geoarcheology, which is a multi-disciplinary approach that uses the techniques and subject matter of geography, geology and other Earth sciences to examine topics, which inform archaeological knowledge and thought. The most beautiful aspect was that every time I fell in love with a country and its civilization, I would realize that a lot of that civilization came from another country and so on and so forth – it was a domino effect of many overlapping cultures providing an unlimited bank of knowledge and fascination.

I was lucky to be able to live my dream, which combined my passions all at once, as it fed my curiosity while traveling the world with my family. I traveled to Greece, Turkey, the Balkans, central Asia, Australia, China, India, Saudi Arabia, amongst many more, sometimes on horseback, a hobby that I am happy to share with my daughter. Of course, I found a lot of pleasure in my work, but I also love simple things such as reading a good book, listening to music and swimming, for I naturally grew up by the sea; in addition to spending time with my family.

Looking back, I realize that my journey would have been very different had I not reacted positively to every opportunity that I was faced with trying to make the most out of the circumstances. In addition, I could not have achieved any of it without the endless support of my family. I am therefore very grateful.

How would you describe your experience as the Vice Chancellor of Paris-Sorbonne Abu Dhabi?

It is a wonderful and challenging experience in many different levels. I have always been passionate about traveling to new countries and discovering new civilizations as well as exploring different opportunities to enhance my career's journey. Therefore, when I was appointed as the Vice Chancellor of Paris-Sorbonne University Abu Dhabi, I was looking forward to move to the UAE and be part of this great project.

On another hand, the university has proved that the exportation of the French Education in a foreign country is a successful step especially in a country like the UAE, which is known as a global hub for innovation and research. Today, we bring together over 77 nationalities from around the world that work together in harmony.

We could have not achieved our goals and made this project successful without the support of the Abu Dhabi government and the Abu Dhabi Education Council (ADEC) as well as the support of Paris-Sorbonne University Abu Dhabi 's Management and its staff.

In 2016, we celebrated the university's 10 year anniversary – what does this milestone mean to you?

After the positive outcome of Sorbonne University in Abu Dhabi and following the Azerbaijan Government invitation, we officially launched our Foundation Degree Year Centre, which started its activities at the Western University in Baku, the capital city of

Within the framework of this cooperation between Paris-Sorbonne University Abu Dhabi and Western University, which is one of the best-ranked universities in Azerbaijan, the milestone of the programme is an opportunity for Azerbaijani students to learn French in their homeland in Azerbaijan, Baku; hence this cooperation will prepare the students to continue their studies at both Paris-Sorbonne University in France and Paris-Sorbonne University in Abu Dhabi. The Foundation Year Degree, which covers the period of one year, will start next September.

Are there any current or future plans with other potential countries?

We are currently working on some projects in Tbilisi, Georgia that could be officially launched in September 2018. We will share more details once everything is finalised. This education model in Baku and Tbilisi could be adapted into other countries as well once it reaches its objective.

What would you advise our students in order to succeed in their academic journey?

The UAE is the only foreign country where Paris-Sorbonne University is totally exported. This fact gives our students a unique opportunity to be part of Sorbonne in Abu Dhabi. The French system is very exigent and it requires lot of hard work on a regular basis; this is why I would advise them to be fully committed without waiting until last minute to do the work.

It is also important for their intellectual progress to be curious and open to learn new things as well taking part of activities outside the study and academic framework. Career paths are crucial, but at the same time, it is important to maintain a good balance and find time to enjoy life.

Our university is hosting several activities where the presence of our students is recommended. Having an intellectual life and practicing some of the things they love such as music, reading, going to the theatre, doing sports, really help in shaping and developing their professional and personal journeys.

In addition, time management is the key to accomplish the most without stress. While studying remains the priority, exploring what is around, helping each other, doing things we love, also complements the academic path and affects it positively.

How do you envision the way forward in the next 10 years?

Our university found its right place in Abu Dhabi and it is sustainably established.

On another hand, the fusion between Paris Sorbonne and Pierre et Marie Curie University will introduce a global university Sorbonne University, which will open various development's opportunities and will support us in building a strategy based on that.

We are also committed to provide our students with all the knowledge and tools they need to graduate as well as to help them achieve their dreams.

We are also looking forward to continue our path in the UAE and to make the best out of it.

A MINUTE WITH...



You hold a bachelor degree in Visual Arts and Economics from New York University and you are currently doing a master's degree in Art History and Museum Studies at Paris-Sorbonne University Abu Dhabi. How do you see both degrees adding value to your career prospects?

I am currently pursuing a specialized Master's degree that will sure provide me with a solid theoretical foundation and practical experience in museum management to propel my creative career.

The Bachelors I earned from New York University is amazingly versatile; since I had two specialisations – Economics and Arts, I took a variety of courses in both disciplines and developed valuable quantitative, analytical and writing skills while keeping my creative streak going.

Travel has been an important recurring theme of my education as I spent semesters in Italy, US and will study in France next year. I believe that demands of multidisciplinary education coupled with relevant internship and work experiences have equipped me to make a lasting contribution to the art scene of the UAE.

What were your best moments in your artistic journey, and are you working on any upcoming art projects?

Without a doubt, the greatest moment in my artistic career until now has been winning the Christo and Jeanne Claude Award of 2017. Inspired by the symbiotic relationship of desert and urban environments of the Emirates I proposed a sculptural installation that will speak about the issues of cultural memory and environmental sustainability. I am now in the process of bringing my idea to life.

No matter the scale of a project, I derive enjoyment from the process of creation, collaboration and problem solving. I can recall the thrill of putting together an illustrated book of Russian folktales in 2015. The journey from concept, to sketches, to print and solo exhibition at NYUAD Art Center was amazing.

Before that, I used an online fundraising platform Kickstarter to co-organize a fine art project in the heart of Vietnam, which resulted in forty largerscale paintings and countless drawings. In between big projects a stream of private commissions keep me painting and inventing.

What was your role when you interned in the United Nations Development Programme and what did you learn from this experience?

I worked as a Communications Intern, hence my duties included research, media analysis and management of social media accounts.

By the end, I gain substantial knowledge and understanding of the specific roles and responsibilities of humanitarians. I learnt to identify countryspecific issues and brainstorm, implement and evaluate solutions. I also had a lot of fun documenting UNDP's work through photography and social media posts.

Overall, through this immersive experience, I gained insight into the nature of UNDP as a unique platform for promoting peaceful international cooperation.

Based on your personal reflections in the past years, what would you advise other students who wish to pursue a similar field to yours?

My advice would be to stay curious, keep a positive attitude and apply oneself as much as possible to every learning and work opportunity within the field.

Finally, where do you see yourself in five years?

My goal is to be working in the UAE art scene and contributing to the realisation of its enormous potential. My primary ambition is to be working on the Louvre or Guggenheim project in the future. I can also see myself pursuing a specialised Art History PhD at some point down the line.

For the more daring traveller - travel the Yungas Road

The Yungas Road is a road leading from La Paz to Corioico and is widely regarded as the "world's most dangerous road". Ascending to 4,650 metres, this single-lane road has few guardrails and cliffs of up to 600 metres high! While that may sound like an unusual holiday attraction, several thousand travellers, mostly mountain biking enthusiasts scale the road path by car or bike every year taking in the beautiful scenery along the way. And not forgetting the "street cred" in being able to say you did it! Caution though – only the most adventurous travellers need apply!

To the west of South America lies Bolivia, a landlocked country covering over 1,000,000 square kilometres. Bolivia's intriguing history dates over 2,500 years resulting in a dynamic, multi-ethnic culture, a fusion of world cuisines and outstanding natural beauty. In this issue, we explore this littleknown country and all it has to offer as it breaks through on the international stage as a growing magnet for international tourism.

A BRIEF HISTORY

Around 2,500 years ago, the Aymara people who were believed to be a part of the Tiwanaku Empire occupied the area known as modern-day Bolivia. Through well-negotiated and peaceful expansion, the Tiwanaku Empire expanded exponentially between AD 600 and 700 throughout the Andes region on the West coast of South America. Until AD 950, the Tiwanaku Empire controlled a sizeable portion of territory but sudden climate change resulted in a major drought and a gradual waning in the empire's power. In AD 1,000, Tiwanaku dried up completely and remained uninhabited until the 1400's, when the Inca's arrived.

The Incas controlled much of Andean Bolivia and the fringes of the Amazon basin for 100 years but were defeated by the Spaniards during the Spanish conquest of the Inca Empire between 1524 and 1533. Nearly 300 years of Spanish rule came to an end during the Napoleonic wars and anti-colonial sentiment. Bolivia was officially recognised as an independent state in 1847.

WHAT TO SEE

"Fly through the clouds" at the Salar de Uyuni

Probably Bolivia's main tourist attraction, the Salar de Uyuni is a markedly unique destination comprising the world's largest salt flat of over 12,000km. Often referred to as the world largest natural mirror, the salty ground literally reflects the sky above it. When this happens, the horizon disappears and some visitors have commented that if you drive through here on a clear day, you feel as though you're flying through the clouds because you don't have clear breakpoint between the ground and the sky.

At the Salar de Uyuni, visitors can stay in a hotel made completely out of salt, spot flamingos at Laguna Hedionda, visit bubbling sulphur pools at the Solar de Manaña geyser basin, marvel at old cave paintings and much more. There are several tourist agencies that offer day and multi-day packages to visit all the main sights.

Step back in time at Tiwanaku

Visit the capital of the powerful Tiwanaku Empire. A declared UNESCO World Heritage Site, Tiwanaku boasts the towering remains of this significant period in Bolivia's history. Boasting impressive ashlar stones, an extensive water drainage system and The Pyramid of Akapana (an imposing 18m pyramid constructed of 7-layered platforms), Tiwanaku is not to be missed on a trip to Bolivia. Other attractions include a large rectangular open temple (used as an observatory), the Gate of the Sun (an artistic piece believed to be an agricultural calendar) and 50,000 raised agricultural fields (an important method of farming in the day).

Kick back on Isla del Sol

Isla del Sol is a large island located in Lake Titicaca located to the West of Bolivia. It boasts traditional communities, quirky hotels and restaurants, ruins, beaches, sweeping views, hiking trails and plenty of sunshine. Access to the island is by boat only and it is recommended that guests stay 2-3 nights to enjoy all the sights on offer. There are no motorised vehicles or paved roads so pack in a good pair of hiking boots to get around.

Some of the activities for visitors include a gold museum housing Inca treasures, an Inca table believed to have been used for human sacrifices, the Inca steps (200 steps leading to the "Fountain of Youth" at the end of them) and numerous temples. The "Chincana" meaning "place where one gets lost" is a labyrinth-like complex and one of Isla del Sol's most impressive ruins. Within it, the Palacio del Inco comprises a series of stonewalls, rectangular rooms and tiny passageways that offer a glimpse into 15th century living.

Hiking is a great way to soak up the island culture. You'll pass by tiny settlements, agricultural terraces, grazing animals and take in the spectacular views of the snowcapped peaks of Cordillera Real. And if you just want to put your feet up, there's plenty opportunity for that too!



La Paz

La Paz is the capital city of Bolivia and the highest capital city in the world with an elevation of 3,650 metres (11,975 ft) above sea level. Located 68km southeast of Lake Titicaca, La Paz sits in a bowl-like depression and is surrounded by the high mountains of the Altiplano. La Paz has an unusual subtropical highland climate with rainy summers and dry winters.

La Paz was founded in 1548 by the Spanish conquistador Captain Alonso de Mendoza at the Inca site of the settlement of Laja. Today, it is the seat of the Bolivian government and the location of the Presidential Palace and numerous government departments. It is an important cultural centre home to several landmarks from the colonial era including the San Francisco Church, the Metropolitan Cathedral and the Plaza Murillo (the city's central plaza). Renowned for its unique markets and vibrant nightlife La Paz is also home to the world's longest and highest urban cable car network. Numerous vantage points or 'lookouts' are dotted around the city for spectacular views of the city and the mountains beyond.

From May to December, La Paz hosts a series of vibrant festivals. Museums are in abundance throughout the city displaying artefacts from Bolivia's past. Visitors can visit the house of Pedro Domingo Murillo, martyr of the independence revolution of 1809, which displays a collection of old furniture, textiles and colonial art. For the sports enthusiast, La Paz boasts some of the best football teams in the country who play their matches at the Estadio Hernando Siles stadium.

WHAT TO EAT

Traditional Bolivian cuisine stems from a fusion of Spanish cuisine, indigenous ingredients and old Aymara traditions. Later influences from other South American countries, Germany, Italy, France and Arab countries have shaped Bolivia's culinary scene today. The expansion of tourism and immigration to Bolivia has created an increase in demand for a range of dining choices from cheap traditional to contemporary fine dining. Lunch is the main meal of the day so go big when dining out during the day.

In terms of the food itself, traditional Bolivian cuisine consists of three core ingredients corn, potatoes and beans. These ingredients are mixed with chicken, beef, rice and wheat to create a combination of appetising dishes. Dishes are shaped by where they come from – food from the Altiplano high in the Andes tend to be spicier whereas food from the Amazon region tends to consist of fish and vegetables and milder on the palate.

DINING IN LA PAZ

Fine Dining

Gustu in La Paz is the place to go for contemporary fine dining with dishes and ingredients that are exclusively Bolivian. Frequently ranked as Bolivia's best restaurant and placed amongst the best in South America, Gustu is not to be missed. It's not even that expensive either!

Street Food

With a capacity for over 1,000 traders and located in the centre of La Paz, the Mercado Lanza street market is spread over four floors selling everything from clothes to authentic Bolivian street fare. Mercado Lanza is open from day to night with numerous 'hole-inthe-wall' restaurants serving meals, snacks, juices and ice creams for under a dollar.

Something a little different

For a unique experience, head down to La Costilla de Adan, a 2-storey building home to a museum housing over 19,000 antique pieces with a restaurant inside. Walls and any available spaces are crammed with lamps, dolls, radios, books and old film posters offering a perfect alternative for artists, bohemians and travellers who want something a little different.



Urban legend suggests that you are "macho" if you can finish a plate yourself, hence the name of the dish.

HERE IS A COLLECTION OF FOUR OF BOLIVIA'S SIGNATURE FOODS



SALTEÑAS

Salteñas are savoury pastries filled with beef or chicken mixed in a sweet or spicy sauce. They sometimes contain peas, eggs, olives and raisins. Salteñas are quintessentially Bolivian and a common snack that can be found throughout the country. As salteñas are typically consumed as a mid-morning snack, it's best to get to the food stalls before midday as they sell out fast.



PAPAS RELLENAS

A dish originally of Peruvian origin but widely adopted in Bolivia, Papas Rellenas are baked potatoes which are stuffed with a hard boiled egg, chopped beef, onions, whole olives, cumin and other spices, and coated with a flour batter. They are deep fried and served with a salsa sauce. Vegetarian options are also available.



CH'ARKI

Ch'arki is dried, salted meat (similar to beef jerky), traditionally made from llama meat. Ch'arki was popular during the days before refrigeration as salt was used to preserve meat. The Inca Empire used to the stock inns along the Inca road system so that travellers would have something to eat and since then, ch'arki has become one of the most popular staple snacks in Bolivia. Although ch'arki is available in beef and horse, we suggest going all out and trying the llama variety!



PIQUE MACHO

Those with large appetites, line up! Pique Macho quite literally, is a heaped plate consisting of beef and French fry cut potatoes along with onions, boiled egg, locoto (a type of chilli pepper), mustard, mayonnaise and ketchup. Pique macho is traditionally served hot. For those with smaller appetites, smaller portions are called "pique" – but, where's the fun in that?

RECIPE **SALTEÑAS**

DIRECTIONS

- **1.** Sprinkle the gelatin over the 1/2 cup cold water in a heat-proof dish; set aside for 10 minutes. Microwave the rehydrated gelatin for 30 seconds or until melted (or melt it over a pot of simmering water). Transfer the melted gelatin to a small bowl and refrigerate until set.
- **2.** Place the potatoes into a saucepan, cover with water, and bring to a boil over medium heat. Reduce heat, and simmer until the potatoes are cooked but still firm, about 10 minutes. Remove from water, allow to cool, and shred into a bowl; set aside.
- **3.** Heat the olive oil in a skillet over medium heat. Stir in the onion; cook and stir until the onion has softened and turned translucent, about 5 minutes. Add the ground beef, and cook until the meat is no longer pink, breaking it up into crumbles as it cooks, about 10 minutes. Drain excess grease. Stir in the shredded potatoes, peas, spring onion, parsley, 4 teaspoons sugar, 2 teaspoons paprika, cumin, salt and black pepper, and 3 tablespoons jalapeno sauce (optional). Simmer filling until hot, about 3 minutes. Remove from heat and set aside.
- 4. Preheat an oven to 425 degrees F (220 degrees C). Lightly grease a baking sheet, or line it with parchment paper.
- **5.** Combine the flour, 1/4 cup sugar, and 1 teaspoon of salt. Cut in the butter with a knife or pastry blender until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs. (This can also be done in a food processor: pulse the butter and flour mixture until it looks like cornmeal.

Turn mixture into a bowl and proceed). Slowly add the hot water and knead until smooth, about 3 minutes. Keep the dough covered with plastic wrap or a clean kitchen towel to keep it warm. Divide the dough into 16 pieces and roll them into balls. Keep the other balls of dough covered with a towel while you roll out each round.

- **6.** On a lightly floured surface, roll each ball of dough into a 1/8-inch-thick circle. Whisk the beaten eggs and 2 teaspoons water in a small bowl. Lightly brush egg wash on the edges of the dough circle. Place about 2 tablespoons of the meat filling on one half of the dough round; top it with about a 1/2 teaspoon of hard-boiled egg, 1/4 teaspoon of gelatin, a few sliced black olives, and some raisins.
- 7. Fold the dough over the filling. Seal and scallop the edges of the dough together. To scallop, start at one edge of the half circle: fold a small piece of dough (the size of your fingernail) over the seam and press gently. Fold another small piece of dough over the seam so that it overlaps the first piece; repeat until you have sealed the half circle. (You may also seal the saltenas by pressing a fork around edges.)
- **8.** Place the saltena on the prepared baking sheet and continue with the remaining dough and filling. Whisk the paprika into the remaining egg wash and brush the saltenas with the egg wash. Bake in the preheated

HALO NEUROSCIENCE LE FUTUR

Les générations présentes s'identifient à l'utilisation des nouvelles technologies au niveau mondial. Aujourd'hui, tout le monde dispose d'un téléphone portable, d'un ordinateur et même d'une tablette. On ne peut rien faire sans l'aide d'Internet : les courses, la communication, l'apprentissage... presque tout a la possibilité d'être fait en ligne, et la plupart du temps, cette option est tellement plus facile.

Aujourd'hui, plus que jamais, notre société s'approche de plus en plus de la société qu'on a créée dans les films de science-fiction : ces sociétés futuristes dans lesquelles tout le monde a des robots qui sont absolument impensables. Ceux qui font tout pour nous et nous rendent la vie meilleure et beaucoup plus simple. Mais ces machines inenvisageables et tellement désirées pour tous ne sont plus si irréelles. « Halo Neuroscience » est une entreprise américaine qui a créé un gadget similaire à ces machines futuristes ; de plus, ils ont montré comment on peut utiliser la technologie dans le domaine de la biologie. « Halo Neuroscience » était au début une société créée afin d'aider grâce à la technologie le domaine de la neurobiologie (ils ont inventé notamment une machine spéciale pour traiter l'épilepsie). Après cette invention, « Halo » a été officiellement fondée pour travailler sur leur prochain projet en 2013 : « Halo Sport ».

« Halo Neuroscience » est constituée par un groupe de médecins, neuroscientifiques, athlètes, stylistes et ingénieurs ; c'est pour cette raison que « Halo Neuroscience » est une institution centrée sur la neurobiologie. Leur dernière invention est une possible application de la technologie neurobiologique au sport. Le « Halo Sport » est un set d'écouteurs –comme des écouteurs de musique, ou des casques qui réduisent le bruit- pour améliorer la performance des athlètes. Ces écouteurs stimulent l'augmentation des courants électriques dans le cerveau, entre les neurones, pour acquérir des résultats après l'entraînement plus rapidement. Tout le monde sait que la pratique fait la perfection ; cependant, la pratique pour faire la perfection en sport peut être lente et peut prendre beaucoup de temps. Donc, « Halo Sport » cherche à faire ça plus facilement et rapidement. Au début, cette invention était exclusivement pour athlètes professionnels, mais finalement, le 16 novembre elle a été lancée sur le marché, donc n'importe qui peut l'acheter. Jusqu'à présent, tous les témoignages montrent l'efficacité de ce produit. Les athlètes disent que ce produit les a aidés à acquérir des résultats (par exemple, ils peuvent sauter plus haut en moins de temps ; ça serait impossible ou très difficile sans les casques).

Pas uniquement dans le domaine du sport, mais aussi dans celui de la musique ! Un jeune Espagnol l'a testé pour pratiquer et jouer du piano. Et les résultats sont apparemment positifs : il a dit qu'il avait appris des partitions musicales plus rapidement qu'avant. Il a fait une vidéo qu'on peut trouver sur YouTube, expliquant le but de son expérience avec le produit. Le produit n'est pas encore très connu, mais il y a de plus en plus publicités sur lui. On ne sait pas si ce produit a des conséquences négatives pour notre cerveau puisqu'il est encore trop tôt. Pour l'instant, les résultats sont positifs, et « Halo Neuroscience » a créé quelque chose de futuriste qui réveillera la curiosité et l'intérêt de beaucoup de personnes, de plus en plus tôt ! En fin de compte, c'est un produit révolutionnaire.

LE GAZ DE SCHISTE

Depuis des milliers d'années, sous nos pieds des micro-organismes sans défense se changent en gaz. Une partie remonte vers la surface devenant le gaz naturel tandis que l'autre reste coincée entre 2000 et 3000 mètres de profondeur dans la roche de schiste. Un vrai trésor à l'heure où le gaz naturel se raréfie et où son prix s'envole. Reste à trouver la bonne « épuisette » pour récolter ses bulles.

Dans les années 80 les industriels américains ont l'idée de la fracturation hydraulique. Le principe est de fissurer la roche de schiste avec des charges explosives puis d'envoyer à très haute pression un mélange de sable, d'eau et de produits chimiques. Les bulles de gaz ainsi secouées remontent via un forage à la surface. Cela nécessite de grandes quantités d'eau, près de 15 millions de litres pour chaque fracturation, ce qui peut se répéter dix fois sur un seul et même gisement. Malgré la surveillance, le mélange envoyé à haute pression peut parfois s'infiltrer jusqu'aux nappes phréatiques et les polluer.

Mais les réserves en gaz de schiste sont considérables plus de 185 000 milliards de mètres cube sur l'ensemble du globe, notamment en Chine, aux États-Unis et pour l'Europe en Pologne et en France. Les réserves supposées sous le sol français pourraient assurer plus d'un siècle d'autonomie gazière. Mieux encore, derrière les bulles de gaz de schiste, se cache du pétrole de schiste.

De plus, c'est aussi une source d'emplois. Aux États-Unis en 2010, 600 000 travailleurs dépendaient de l'extraction du gaz de schiste.

Risques écologiques ou enjeux énergétiques et sociaux, exploités ou non, le gaz de schiste reste un vrai choix politique.
